

Mrs. Roosevelt Will Conduct Hobby Lobby Show Wednesday

First Lady Pinch Hitting For Dave Elman; Kay Kyser And Band To Make New RKO Film

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt will not only discuss the hobbies of the Roosevelt family, but will interview a variety of hobbyists from all walks of life when she pinch-hits for Dave Elman as conductor of the Hobby Lobby program Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. over WJZ.

Among the hobbyists whom the first lady of the land will interview are Connie Boswell, torch-singer; Iso Brisselli, the violinist; John "Jingles" Donahue, a policeman who writes out his tickets in verse; a man who collects collars, and another hobbyist who has the largest collection of criminal knives in the world.

In addition, Mrs. Roosevelt will tell about the most famous hobbyist in America, President Roosevelt, a stamp collector.

Another feature of the program will be provided by Harry Salter and his orchestra, who will mark the occasion with a special medley of Mrs. Roosevelt's favorite songs.

Completing their engagement in San Francisco, Kay Kyser and his troupe of musical entertainers will head for Hollywood where their College of Musical Knowledge program will originate Wednesday from 9:00 to 10:00 p. m., over WEA. The Kyser organization will remain in the film city for an indefinite period while they go before the camera in RKO's forthcoming picture, "That's Right, You're Wrong."

With more than 50,000 contributions by radio listeners to choose from, Fred Uttal and Arlene Francis will fire a wide variety of clues at members of the studio audience during the guessing game, "What's My Name?" Wednesday, at 8:00 p. m., over WEA. Heavy response from listeners in all parts of the country has indicated what they consider fair tests of the average person's store of information.
