

Labor - Industry Series To Be Opened By AFL Leader

Bartender Who Won Two Prizes For Knitting And Crocheting Will Be Guest On Ripley Program

Outstanding leaders of labor and industry in America, will give their views on problems relating to the country's economic and industrial future in a new series of weekly programs to be presented by the NBC in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Labor, beginning Friday.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, will be heard on the opening program, Friday, over WEAJ from 9:30 to 9:45 p. m.

The programs, to be titled, "America Unlimited," will be in the form of interviews conducted by officials of the Department of Labor. Labor leaders will be interviewed on the first six programs and industrial leaders on the last six.

Green will be interviewed by Marshall Dimock, assistant secretary of labor, and will discuss the contribution American workers can make toward a happier economic future.

A rugged bartender who won two prizes for knitting and crocheting will be on Bob Ripley's "Believe It or Not" program over WABC Friday at 9:30 p. m. He is Harry Haberman of Wisconsin, who also doubles as a bouncer. In addition, John F. Cann, truckdriver, will tell how he entered his self-made dollies in a Boston contest and won first prize over 100 women entrants. Ripley's dramatization will revolve around a French painter who, after losing the use of his hands in a duel, learned how to paint with his feet and was decorated by the French government for his masterpieces which now hang in the Louvre and British art museum.

What every woman wants to know about television — how to look your best on the television screen, what to wear and how to make up—will be told by Sue Read, NBC television entertainer, when she is heard on the Death Valley Days broadcast over the WEAJ on Friday at 8:30 p. m.
