

Order Of Adventurers Will Hold First Annual Outing

Lowell Thomas Playing Host To Group; Admiral Byrd To Give Plans For Next Trip

The first annual outing of The Order of Adventurers will be held this week-end when initiates and members of the executive board spend three days golfing, fishing and swimming at the Pawling, N. Y., estate of Lowell Thomas.

The commentator's guests are to include Webb Miller, European manager of the United Press and Sir Hubert Wilkins, Arctic explorer, candidates for membership in the order, and Admiral Richard E. Byrd, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, Commander Felix Riesenbergl and Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews who, with Thomas, make up the board.

The festivities at Pawling will be climaxed Monday by a soft-ball game between Thomas' "Nine Old Men" of the "Oysters" of Oyster Bay, L. I. after which proceedings of the regular O. of A. meeting are to be broadcast over WJZ at 7 p. m.

The broadcast will include a detailed report by Admiral Byrd regarding plans for his forthcoming trip to the Antarctic. When he sails for Little America this Fall, he will reveal, he intends to remain a member of the Order's executive board, and "attend" its weekly meetings by means of his powerful short wave radio transmitter.

Miller, a famous war correspondent and author, will tell of an astounding experience which he underwent just after the World war Armistice was signed. Sir Hubert's story will deal with the curious ideas of justice held by a tribe of Eskimos which he encountered on one of his voyages of discovery.

"Greetings Gate, let's synopate!" This phrase, Jerry Colonna's self-introductory salutation, will echo over WJZ at 8 p. m. when the "mad professor" makes a guest appearance on the Magic Key program. Also appearing will be Shep Fields and his Victor Recording Orchestra, creators of the "bubbling rhythm" style of dance music. Colonel Lemuel Q. Stoopnagle, Nathaniel Shilkret and the Victor Concert Orchestra, the Rodgers Sisters and LeRoy Miller complete the cast. The programs will be heard weekly hereafter at the new time, 8 to 9 p. m.

"From the Land of the Sky Blue Water" by Cadman will be the featured soprano solo by Margaret Speaks during the program conducted by Alfred Wallenstein from 7:30 to 8 p. m. over WEAf. Miss Speaks also will sing Drigo's "Serenade," Kreisler's "Stars in My Eyes" and the Italian Street Song from Herbert's "Naughty Marietta." Wallenstein will direct the orchestra in the Overture to Wolf-Ferrari's "Secrets of Suzanne," Infante's "El Ritmo" and Waldtente's "L'Estudiante" Waltz.

An all-Russian program, featuring compositions by Tschai-kowsky, Rachmannoff, Moussorgsky and Zucca, will be presented by Opal Craven, soprano, the Continentals Quartet and the orchestra during the Contented broadcast from 9 to 9:30 p. m. over WEAf. Miss Craven will be heard in Bachmeteff's "Cossack Lullaby," and Remholdt Schmidt, basso, will sing Zucca's "Nichavo." The quartet will offer Kiriloff's "The Village Peddler," "Brightly Shines the Moon," "Kazbek," "I have Pity" and "Red Sarafan," and the orchestra will play Tschai-kowsky's "Trepak," Rachmannoff's Prelude in G Minor, the Polonaise from Moussorgsky's "Boris Goudonow," and Tschai-kowsky's "Marche Slav."
