er Changes He Won't Broadcasters

If Hitler changes his mind again and decides to make his scheduled address at Tannenberg Sunday morning, radio is prepared to give his words world-wide airing. Stations WIBA, WBBM, WMAQ, WLS, WIND, and WCFL will bring the dictator's words to this area starting at 4:30 a. m. Late Friday night it was announced Hitler intended to cancel the address—but just in case he changes his mind again, here's the air schedule:

4:30 a. m.—Preliminary remarks pertaining to the visit of the dictator to Tannenberg. (Above stations.)

4:40 a. m.—Hitler's speech. (Above stations.)

5:30 a. m.—Summary of Hitler's address (WBBM): with Judge John Guiknecht and Clifton M. Utely.

11 a. m.—Dorothy Thompson (WTBA): comments on the speech.

1:30 p. m.—Reports from Europe (WIBA): Berlin, Paris, London, Warsaw, and Washington report current developments.

Radio will continue its 24-hour vigil in keeping listeners posted on latest reports. Bulletin broadcasts will continue throughout the weekend. Outstanding programs scheduled for tonight, but subject to change without notice, follow:

6:30 p. m.—Red Skelton's Review (WMAQ): "Oh You Crazy Moon," highlighted.
