

College All-Star Football Game Broadcast Scheduled

Bill Stern To Handle Mike In Chicago's Benefit Classic; Program Set At 8:30 P. M. Wednesday

As the College All-Stars clash with the professional New York Giants in the Chicago Tribune's annual football classic at Soldier Field on Wednesday, Bill Stern will be in the stadium to give a tackle-by-tackle description of the game for the WJZ audience. The broadcast, starting at 9:30 p. m. will end at approximately 11:15 p. m.

Assisting Stern behind the mikes will be Fort Pearson handling the color during the intervals of play. Receipts of the game, attended annually by some 100,000 fans, will be turned over to Chicago relief agencies. NBC has covered the games since 1934.

Lowell Thomas, famous NBC commentator, will be the pinch-hitting host of Hobby Lobby over WJZ, Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. Dave Elman is scheduled to return to his regular post on September 6. Thomas was originally scheduled for August 16 but postponed his appearance when Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt returned to the program for a second visit as guest mistress-of-ceremonies.

Ransom Sherman will present another of his fast-moving variety shows on Wednesday from 7:00 to 7:30 p. m., over WJZ. The program will feature Edward Davies, baritone, the Vagabonds, Negro male quartet, songs by Betty Barrett, and the orchestra under Joseph Gallicchio.
