

FDR Reveals on Europe

President Roosevelt will define the United States' course of action regarding the European crisis tonight at 8 over the nation's three major networks. Speaking from the White House, the president is expected to proclaim a "hands-off" policy for this country. Stations in this area which are expected to carry the address include WIBA, WBBM, WGN, WIND, WMAQ, and WENR.

For other broadcasts concerning the crisis see the "Discussion" classification below. The major networks will be on the air for the entire 24-hour period today and the remainder of the week if European events warrant special coverage.

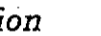

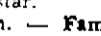
