

Jean Ellington Will Sing With Riggs And Betty Lou

NBC's Glamour Girl To Be Heard At 7 P. M. Monday; Order Of Adventurers Has Unusual Talent

Jean Ellington, NBC's glamour girl singer, will be with Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou Monday at 7:00 p. m. over WEAf. Freddie Rich's orchestra will accompany the guest star when she sings her solo.

On the comedy end of the half hour program, Betty Lou will enter Tommy's pictures in a 'handsome bridegroom' contest, prize for which is a free honeymoon trip to Niagara Falls. The ensuing complications involve a strong supporting cast.

Miss Ellington, a native of San Francisco, got into radio when she won Eddie Duchin's "radio open" over 1,200 other entrants.

Her guest appearance on the Tommy Riggs program will be her first meeting with the man who dreamed up Betty Lou and made her a national figure almost overnight.

A Connecticut housewife who, singlehanded, saved her two babies from death in last year's hurricane, and a New York newspaper photographer who "scooped" the police during a raid on a gang hideout, but nearly paid for it with his life, will be initiated into The Order of Adventurers over WJZ, Monday at 7:00 p. m.

Mrs. Frank Ellis of New Haven, who applied by mail for membership in the Order, will tell how she was trapped at a shore cottage near Bayview. With a child in each arm she managed to fight her way to safety thru a night of roaring wind and rapidly rising waters. Her husband also will appear on the program to tell of his repeated but futile efforts to reach the cottage.

Daniel Israel, the photographer, will relate what happened after he got a hot tip that there was to be a gang raid. Camera and flashlight in hand, he ambled into the hideout five minutes ahead of the police and only the quickest of quick thinking kept him from paying the penalty before they arrived.

This broadcast also will make the return of Admiral Richard E. Byrd to the executive board table after an absence of more than a month. He also plans to tell another of his thrilling personal experiences during the course of the meeting.

Maestro Andre Kostelanetz will present his 45-piece orchestra playing the original score of Ravel's famous "Pavane" during the "Tune-Up Time" broadcast to be heard Monday at 7 p. m. over WABC. The "Pavane", composed in 1899 for piano, is another classic which has become a popular hit of the season by adaptation of its major melody into a song entitled "The Lamp Is Low".

Hoagy Carmichael's latest hit melody "Blue Orchids" will also be an orchestral feature of the broadcast.

Master of ceremonies Tony Martin will solo in "Sing My Heart" and "What's New". Kay Thompson and her Rhythm Singers will contribute "Oh, You Crazy Moon". David Laughlin, tenor, will be heard in one of the most famous operatic arias of all time—the clown's lament from Paggiacci, "Vesti La Giubba".

Elgar's famous "Salut D'Amour" will be featured by the Voice of Firestone Orchestra, conducted by Alfred Wallenstein, during the program Monday, from 7:30 to 8:00 p. m., over WEAf. Opening with Von Suppe's "Beautiful Galathea," the program also will include "Morning Journals" by Strauss; Kodaly's "Viennese Musical Clock," and Sari Selections by Kalman. Margaret Speaks, soprano star of the program, will return to the air the following week, Sept. 25.

Musical favorites from the land of the Danube will be featured during the Contented program on Monday, at 9:00 p. m., over the NBC-Red Network. Opal Craven, the Lullaby Lady, will sing Franz Schubert's immortal "Cradle Song" as a highlight of the broadcast. The orchestra, under Josef Pasternack, will play Kreisler's "Kleiner Wiener Marsch," Strauss' "Fledermaus Overture" and a Wiener Medley by B. Leopold. The Continentals Quartet also will offer a medley, "Schonau, Wiener Flackelied" and "Vienna Dudes." Kreisler's popular "The Old Reitan" will be performed as a violin and cello duet.
