

Louis - Pastor Title Battle On WJZ Wednesday Evening

Scrap Scheduled For Air Waves At 9:30 With
Sam Taub And Bill Stern At Mikes To
Describe Action

World's heavyweight champion Joe Louis' defense of his title against challenger Bob Pastor in a 20-round bout at Briggs stadium, Detroit, Wednesday will be described blow-by-blow over WJZ.

Sam Taub and Bill Stern will be at the microphone to bring boxing enthusiasts an exclusive word-picture of the event. Taub will handle the punch-by-punch assignment and Stern will sum up the action between rounds. The broadcast will begin at 9:30 p. m.

The but marks the second meeting between Louis and Pastor, and the Brown Bomber's eighth defense of his title. The champion gained a 10-round decision over Pastor in 1937, shortly before he met Jimmy Braddock to take the title. Both fighters are 25 years old, with Pastor the senior by four months.
