Lucille Manners will sing Friel's "L'Amour Toujours L'Amour," Padilla's "El Relicario" and Mills's "One Magic Hour." Selections by the ensemble will include Kern's "The Way You Look Tonight" and Katscher's "When Day Is Done."
