

Film Stars Will Be Heard On "Screen Guild Theatre"

Rooney, Grant, Judy Garland And Ann Sothorn
Set For Initial Broadcast On Sunday
Evening.

Mickey Rooney, Judy Garland, Cary Grant and Ann Sothorn will raise the curtain on the fall season of the "Screen Guild Theatre" with Roger Pryor as master-of-ceremonies and Oscar Bradley's orchestra over WABC Sunday at 7:30 p. m.

The first program will establish the format for the entire series—a weekly production presenting virtually every screen star in Hollywood in roles in which the respective talents of each may be best displayed.

Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland have just returned to Hollywood from a personal appearance tour in the East with Judy's new picture, "The Wizard of Oz." Like Grant and Miss Sothorn—who is Roger Pryor's wife—their radio appearances are so few as to make this a distinctively novel opening show.

For the first time Judy Garland will introduce her new song "God's Country."

David Niven and Anita Louise, two up-and-coming screen stars, will be guests of Don Ameche, Sunday, at 8:00 p. m. over WEAF. Niven will do a comedy spot and Miss Louise, besides splintering a few remarks with Charlie McCarthy, is to be heard in a one-act dramatic skit. Three of the regulars, Nelson Eddy, Don Ameche and Dorothy Lamour, will supply the vocals, while a fourth, E-B-B, will operate Charlie.

An appeal to sailors at sea to keep in touch with their families at every possible opportunity will be made on the Hour of Charm program on Sunday, by Mrs. Janet ("Shipmate") Roper, founder of the Missing Seamen's Bureau in New York. The message, on WEAF at 10:00 p. m. will be relayed to sailors afloat and in foreign lands over station WGEA at Schenectady.

Mrs. Roper has located more than 5,000 missing sailors and put them in contact with their families since she founded the bureau in 1920. Her messages to missing seamen usually travel only by word of mouth. In her broadcast, she will urge every one to send a letter home from every port, to allay the present-day anxiety of parents, families, wives and sweethearts.

Mrs. Roper will be introduced by John Anderson, dramatic critic of the New York Journal-American and master of ceremonies of the program, as the "Woman of the Week," an added feature of the new Hour of Charm series.
