

# Roundtable Recovery as Talk on War

Winston Churchill's address on "The First Month of the War" will be broadcast from London through NBC-WENR at 2:15 p. m. today.

While the nation waits for the world series to help take its mind off its troubles, national and international affairs will be discussed on the air today.

Five senators and a one-time presidential candidate will discuss the foreign relations situation. Among the senators will be C. M. Reed (R., Kans.), who will talk at 8:45 p. m. through WENR, and Burton K. Wheeler (D., Mont.), who will speak at 4:30 p. m. through WBBM and WIND. The third speaker will be former Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York who will tell WBBM listeners at 6 p. m. why he favors revision of the neutrality law.

A discussion of the neutrality bill will be offered by WGN at 7 p. m. Participants will be Sens. Key Pittman (D., Nev.), Tom Connelly (D., Tex.), Gerald P. Nye (R., N. Dak.), and Frederick Van Nuys (D., Ind.)

National affairs will be discussed on the University of Chicago Roundtable under the title, "How Will We Get Recovery?" Participants in the broadcast on WIBA and WMAQ at 1:30 p. m. will be Dean William H. Spencer of the university's school of business; Prof. Paul H. Douglas, Chicago and Prof. Arthur W. Marget, University of Minnesota economist.
