Speakers in the first section will be King Leopold III of Belgium, speaking from Brussels, and Dorothy Thompson, whose column appears regularly in The State Journal.

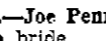

11 p. m.—Music You Want (WENR): Tschaikowsky's first piano concerto, recorded by Arthur Rubinstein and the London Symphony.

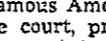

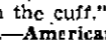

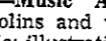
