

Benny Troupe To Present "The Women" Sunday Night

Revised Version Of Famous Story Set For Air Waves; John Garfield Has Lead In Silver Theatre Drama

Jack Benny who learned about the ladies from Dennis Day's mother, will incorporate his new found wisdom in a dramatic parody of the screen hit, "The Women," during the broadcast with Mary Livingstone, Don Wilson, Phil Harris and Andy Devine over WEAF Sunday at 7 p. m. Benny had planned to present "The Rains Came" this week, but the Hollywood weather man's prediction of fair and warmer made the effort unseasonal.

The opening scene of "The Women" as revised by Benny and Co. will be in Maizie's Beauty Salon, famous for the way they do Phil Harris' hair.

Jack has come to see what Maizie can do with his toupe.

Dennis Day's mother, Lucretia, will play the role taken by Mary Boland in the screen version of the Claire Boothe play, unless the Marines arrive in time to back up Jack.

John Garfield, who planned to be a doctor until the stage claimed him, will have his first opportunity to play the role of a surgeon when he stars in the two-part Silver Theatre drama, "The Road Goes Further," the first episode of which will be heard over WABC Sunday, at 6 p. m. The second and final chapter of the original drama directed by Conrad Nagel will be presented the following Sunday, Nov. 12.

"The Road Goes Further," an original radio play by True Boardman, written especially for Garfield's appearance, will be dedicated to the unsung heroes in the United States Public Health Service, particularly those whose lives have been devoted to the fight against pellagra.
