

Romance With A Wallop To Be Presented By Playhouse

"For All Of Our Lives" Will Star Ida Lupino And Herbert Marshall Over WEA-F At 8 P. M. Wednesday

Romance packing a wallop wends its way to the microphone on Wednesday evening, when the Hollywood Playhouse presents a radio adaptation of Ursula Parrott's popular novel, "For All Of Our Lives," over WEA-F at 8 p. m.

Lovely Ida Lupino, who recently scored a hit in the motion picture, "The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes," will guest star opposite Herbert Marshall.

"For All Of Our Lives" is the stirring story of a talented young actress to whom overnight come love and fame. But heartbreak hovers in the wings of Gillian Dwight's triumphant march to fortune is accomplished thru a veil of tears.

Herbert Marshall falls heir to the part of Derek Waring, malice idol, who plays his greatest role offstage. Here is a story radio audiences will carry with them long after the microphone has ceased to resound with the last dramatic echo.

So the funster whiled away his idle hours by looking up such personalities and talking with them. This idea he adapted for the air.
