

Jimmy Shields, Irish Tenor, Signed Up By Fibber McGee

Vocalist Will Replace Donald Novis On Program Tuesday; Judy Garland To Be Heard On Bob Hope Show

Jimmy Shields, Irish and a tenor but not what is technically known as an "Irish tenor," is the new vocalist on the Fibber McGee and Molly program effective Tuesday, when he replaces Donald Novis, off the program to fulfill personal appearance engagements up and down the west coast.

Shields, heretofore heard on another program, will broadcast at 9:30 p. m. over WEA. Shields' first song will be "Begin the Beguine."

Born in Hamilton, Ont., Shields is six feet tall and weighs 180 pounds. Away from the mike, he studies opera and recently got an orchid from Walter Winchell for the deft way in which he handles a song.

Judy Garland will sing the swing version of "Dardanella" on the weekly Bob Hope broadcast Tuesday at 10:30 p. m. over WEA. Green also will direct the orchestra in the opening selection "Goodie Good-bye." Hoagy Carmichael's latest hit "Blue Orchids" and a medley of football songs in honor of the Universities of Maine, Louisiana State and Southern Methodist. The Swing Fourteen will offer to "Make With the Kisses" and tenor Floyd Sherman will be heard with them in "South of the Border."

Richard Bennett, famed stage star and father of Constance and Joan Bennett, screen stars, will appear with Mort Lewis on the "Fun With the Famous" program over WJZ Tuesday at 10:30 p. m. Also scheduled are Peter Van Steeden, handleader of the Fred Allen and George Jessel programs, and Benny Leonard, undefeated retired lightweight boxing champion.
