

Kyser Show Will Be Heard From His Home In The South

Kay To Play In Rocky Mount, N. C., At World Premier Of His New Film; Dock Rockwell On With Fred Allen

Kay Kyser, creator of radio's college quiz, will meet his students at the Center theatre in Rocky Mount, N. C., for his Wednesday broadcast at 10 p. m. over WEAJ. When he steps up to the microphone in the town of his birth, the genial maestro will be in the midst of a tremendous home-coming celebration in honor of the world premiere of his first picture, "That's Right, You're Wrong." Kyser's band also will be heard playing for a monster dance later in the evening over WEAJ from 12 midnight to 12:30 a. m.

Gov Clyde R. Hoey of North Carolina has accepted an invitation to attend the world premiere of Kyser's picture.

A meeting of two of the most satiric minds in radio will take place when Doc Rockwell jousts with Fred Allen Wednesday at 9 p. m. over WEAJ. One of the first big-time name comedians to go on the air in the early days of radio, Doc Rockwell is such a fountain of sense and nonsense that sometimes it's hard to tell the difference.

Leaving only room for Fred's newsreel and his "Question of the Week" will be the rest of the cast, including Portland Hoffa, Harry von Ze, the Merry Macs with Helen Carroll, songstress Wynn Murray, and Peter Van Steeden and his orchestra. The Mighty Allen Art Players will follow Fred to the badlands in a horse opera thriller, "Murder in the Saddle," or "One Dead Cowboy Is Better Than A Double Feature."
