

Marlene Dietrich To Play in Good News Show Drama

Famous Star Will Also Be Paired With Slapsie
Maxie Rosenbloom In "Beauty And
Beast" Interview

Besides appearing in a special adaptation of "The First Wives Club," Marlene Dietrich will be paired with Slapsie Maxie Rosenbloom in a "beauty and the beast" interview, as featured on the Good News of 1940 Broadcast, Thursday, over WEAF at 9 p. m. Lou Alter's "American Serenade," written especially for the program, will be given its radio premiere as another feature attraction.

Armila Novotna, Czechoslovakian soprano who makes her Metropolitan Opera debut this season in Smetana's "The Bartered Bride," will be guest of Bing Crosby Thursday at 10 p. m. over WEAF.

Archie Novotna, who made her American radio debut last week, will appear with Louis Hayward and Eugene Pallette, film actors, and Reginald Gardiner, comedian.
