

# Grid Coaches Set On Radio Show With Grantland Rice

**"Red" Dawson And Mal Stevens Will Prognosticate On Possibilities In Tulane And Columbia Clash Saturday**

Lucille Manners, soprano, will sing the famous Habanera from Bizet's "Carmen" as her feature solo during the concert Friday at 8 p. m. over WEA.
