FDR to Dedicate His Memorial Library on Air Today at 2

Station WBBM and WENR listeners will hear President Roosevelt today at 2 p. m. when he speaks at the cornerstone-laying exercises of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial library at Hyde Park, N. Y.

The library, which was deeded to the government, will house more than 6,000,000 manuscripts, collected during the 40 years of the president's public career. The structure will be erected at a cost of \$350,000.
