Roosevelt Broadcasts Thanksgiving Message to U. S. at 6:45 Tonight

President Roosevelt's Thanksgiving day message will be broadcast by WIBA at 6:45 tonight from the annual Founder's day banquet at Warm Springs foundation, Georgia.

The chief executive will speak a few minutes before he assumes his annual role as carver-in-chief for the child patients' turkey. The broadcast also will include songs by the children, music by a band of patients, and community singing by the 300 or more persons gathered in Georgia hall for the dinner.
