

College Fight Songs To Be Featured On Tuesday Hour

Johnny Presents Program Will Put Favorites On The Air; Tone Will Be Guest Of O'Keefe

A medley of college "fight" songs will open the Tuesday broadcast of Johnny Presents at 8 p. m. over WEAJ. Swinging out with "Anchors Aweigh" for Navy, the medley also includes Washington State's "Fight Song" and "Go, You Northwestern" for the Wildcats.

The orchestra will be heard in a special arrangement of "South of the Border," featuring Johnny Green at the piano, and "Good Morning." The new Raymond Scott tune, "Boy Scout in Switzerland," will be the initial offering of Beverly and the Swing Fourteen, followed by "Lonesome Road" and "El Rancho Grande" with two-piano accompaniment.
