The careful plans of a New England bride to impress barbarians of San Francisco in 1853 with a brocade dress and velvet cloak take an unexpected turn during the Old Ranger's tale, highlight of Death Valley Days, Saturday at 9:30 p. m. over WEAJ.

"Mrs. Smith Receives" relates the experience of a young lady who was completely taken aback by the proper way in which San Francisco carried out old customs on New Year's Day.

Alec Templeton, wizard of the piano, and Eddie Peabody, American king of the banjo, will lead the National Barn Dance in ringing out the old and welcoming the new year during the Saturday broadcast at 9 p. m. over WJZ. Peabody will be making his first appearance as a regular member of the cast while Templeton will be featured guest. Uncle Ezra, Henry Burr, the Hoosier Hot Shots, Joe Parsons, Ann, Pat and Judy also will be heard.
