

1939 News Told Spotlight 's Airlanes

Two basketball games, a review of the headlines of the year, and a quiz on social security will be tonight's radio highlights.

At 8 p. m. the Wisconsin-Nebraska basketball game will be aired from Milwaukee over station WTMJ. Following this game the Marquette-Iowa contest will be heard.

Also at 8 p. m. but over station WIBA and WMAQ, Arthur J. Altmeyer, chairman of the social security board, will be quizzed by three Washington newsmen. Changes in the social security act which becomes effective during January, 1940, will be discussed.

A dramatization of the headlines of 1938 will be broadcast by station WBBM at 9:15 p. m. The 12 biggest stories of the year, which were picked by more than 1,000 editors of United Press newspapers, will be enacted before the microphone.
