Little Known Story Of "The Strange Friend Of The Pilgrims," Scheduled On WJZ At 9:30 P. M. Tuesday

Sam Jaffe, distinguished American actor, will be star of the fourth chapter of Cavalcade Of America, Tuesday from 9:00 to 9:30 p. m. over WJZ.

The historical drama, "The Strange Friend of the Pilgrims," deals with the settlement of America and presents Jaffe as the Indian, Squanto, who greeted the first settlers in fluent English.

The source material of the little known tale has been supplied by Dr. Frank Monaghan, of the Yale university history department, who with Carl Carmer and Marquis James, makes up the program's historical research board. Dr. Monaghan will be commentator.
