

Jack Dempsey To Bust Gags On Berle Program Saturday

Manassa Mauler Joins Comedy Experts for
Broadcast At 8:30 P. M.; "Youth Vs.
Age" In Wing Spelling Bee

Jack Dempsey will bust gags instead of jaws when he appears as guest on Milton Berle's "Stop Me If You've Heard This One" program, Saturday, at 8:30 p. m. over WEAF. The program, the first of three from Florida, will be broadcast from the Dempsey-Vanderbilt Hotel in Miami. Regular gagbusters Jay Flippen and Senator Edward Ford, and Barry Steward, orchestra leader, will all take part.

Paul Wing, radio spelling master, will take over as referee of the big brain bout, "Youth Versus Age," during the broadcast Saturday. The time and network also will change on that date, when the program will be heard over WEAF from 9:00 to 9:30 p. m. The basic structure of the program will stay the same.

The old ranger will tell the true story of Mrs. Eva Lee Gunn, 80 years old, and the only living eye witness of the Owens Valley, Calif., earthquake of 1872, on "Death Valley Days," Saturday at 9:30 p. m., over WEAF. Only eight at the time, Mrs. Gunn still lives in Owens Valley.

Arch Oboler, who once canvassed dozens of Negro choruses to find just the right voice for one of his plays, is now auditioning Indians, in search of a leading actor for "Back to the Indians," a satire which he will present over WEAF, Saturday at 8:00 p. m. The play is built around the well known wise crack about giving America back to the Indians. So far he has found few Braves brave enough to want any part of it.

"Marry the Gull," Ben Lee's whimsical drama, twice postponed by the Radio Guild, will be produced on Saturday at 8:30 p. m., when the Guild begins a new series of half hour plays over WJZ. This story is of young love and how it came up against the rough side of life but got away unscathed.
