

# Roosevelt To Acknowledge Salute In Paralysis Fight

President Will Be Heard From White House During Program; Famous Bands Will Be Heard

President Roosevelt will acknowledge the nation's salute to his 58th birthday with pickups from birthday celebrations in key cities from coast-to-coast, during a special program, Tuesday over combined networks of the National Broadcasting Co.

The programs also will be carried by the Columbia and Mutual Broadcasting Systems.

The chief executive, introduced by Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, will speak from the White House during the annual program, from 11:15 p. m. to 12:15 a. m., which marks the close of the infantile paralysis fund-raising campaign.

Highlights of celebrations being held in every state of the union will be described during the full-hour broadcast, and such famous dance bands as Isham Jones, from the Boston Garden; Al Dunahue from the Waldorf-Astoria, New York; Kay Kyser from the Mayflower Hotel, Washington; Pinky Tomlin from the Drake Hotel, Chicago, and Bonnie Spencer from Oklahoma City, will be heard by radio listeners.

Merry Widow medley of three songs presented by the Swing Fourteen, with solos by Genevieve Rowe and Bill Hargrove, will be the finale of the Johnny Presents program, Tuesday at 8:00 p. m., over WEA. The songs forming the medley are "Girls, Girls, Girls," "Maxines," and the "Merry Widow Waltz." Johnny Green will play a piano solo, "To You Sweetheart, Aloha," and Glenn Cross, baritone, will sing a solo in a presentation of "Indian Summer" with the Diminuettes, a vocal group. The Swing Fourteen will sing "Ma, He's Making Eyes at Me" and the orchestra will play "You're Letting Grass Grow."

"Mr. Stokes Gets Stucco," grim story of a housing problem that arose when Mrs. Stokes left town and her husband decided to remodel the old homestead, will be "Uncle Walter's Doghouse" drama Tuesday at 10:30 over WEA. Bob Strong's orchestra, Virginia Verrell and the quartet will provide music.

The story of the Declaration of Independence, one of the most vigorous chapters in the growth of the country, will be dramatized during the Cavalcade of America, Tuesday at 9:00 p. m. over WJZ with Thomas Jefferson as the focal point. The cast is headed by John Beal, well known radio, stage and screen star.
