

Dramatization Of Famous Bombing Will Be Aired

Old Ranger Will Accede To Many Requests And Retell True Story Of "The Old Lady Of Death Valley"

Willful, wholesale murder by bombings . . . a trail of clues that lead the police to Europe . . . the combined efforts of laboratory technicians and police in assembling evidence . . . these and other highlights that led to the arrest of Michael Pugmann, after the fateful Wilkes-Barre bombings will be dramatized on Gang Busters Saturday at 8 p. m.

The earth-shaking repercussions which might ensue if a plane-load of film stars, headed eastward to attend the world premiere of a super-super production, should disappear completely, will be envisioned by Arch Oboler during a tongue-in-cheek drama entitled "Hollywood Special" Saturday at 8 p. m. The fantasy, suggested by fanfare surrounding many of Hollywood's recent premiere junkets, will endeavor to show not only how the populace survives the loss of its favorites but also what happens to the stars themselves.

At the repeated requests of listeners the Old Ranger will retell the true story of Ma Harrison, "The Old Lady of Death Valley" on the "Death Valley Days" broadcast Saturday at 9:30 p. m. over WEAF. Ma Harrison's three children make her leave her beloved desert shanty when their father dies. She meets an old desert rat unexpectedly one day, however, and homesickness overwhelms her.

Two short plays by Gordon Webber, talented young member of the National Broadcasting Co.'s Information Division, will be presented by the Radio Guild over WJZ Saturday, at 8:30 p. m. The first is an original entitled "Going Home." The second, based on a story by Tom Carey, is called "Moon Road."

The show will be the second of three consecutive broadcasts from the Dempsey-Vanderbilt Hotel in Miami, Fla.

Monk and Sam, a song and banjo duet, will guest on the Grand Ole Opry program Saturday, 9:30 p. m., over WEAF Red "The Little Tin Lizzie" network. Ford Rush will sing Memories and Uncle Dave Macon's number will be "Nobody's Business." Roy Acuff will do "Love Somebody," an old time mountain ballad.
