The Right Honorable Oliver Stanley, who succeeded Leslie Hore-Belisha as head of Great Britain's war ministry, joins the parade of British cabinet members who have broadcast from London in recent weeks: "The Progress of the War"—WOL, 10 a. m.

Joe Louis and Arturo Godoy, who battle Friday night for the Brown Bomber's heavyweight title, climax their training in their respective camps—WMAL, 5 p. m.

As Cyrano de Bergerac in Edmond Rostand's great play, Charles Boyer has a role vastly different from his matinee idol parts. Tactfully, the Gallic actor has divided his radiozation in two, the second half being tucked away until next Wednesday evening—WRC, 8 p. m.
