

# How Hat Brought Downfall Of Desperado Will Be Told

Gang Busters To Bare Inside Story Of Earl Doyle's  
Capture: Thrills Of Air Derby Set For  
Listeners

Earl Doyle bought himself a hat. It was a very expensive pearl gray felt befitting an ambitious gunman, but he didn't know that it was destined to lead to his being jailed for life—the story of which will be reenacted on "Gang Busters", Saturday at 8:00 p. m., over WABC.

Early in 1933 Doyle and several henchmen crashed thru a crowded thoroughfare in North Kansas City, snatched a pay roll from a bookkeeper, wounded a guard, and shot their way to freedom.

Angered posses, giving pursuit, were outwitted when the gang captured and used one of them as a shield. But the police had one valuable clue in their possession—the tell-tale hat. Using this bit of evidence, they identified Doyle and months later, they traced and captured him as he was undertaking a daring bank robbery.

The famed 1934 London-Melbourne air race, covering a distance of nearly 12,000 miles of jungle fastness, open sea, and isolated desert, with Col. Roscoe Turner and Clyde Pangborn at the controls of the only American plane, will be dramatized in thrilling detail on Sky Blazers, Saturday, 7:30 p. m. over WABC.

Jack Knight, celebrated pilot and present director of public education for United Airlines, will give authenticated details of the race. Knight is temporarily replacing Col. Roscoe Turner, the regular master-of-ceremonies, who returns to the show Feb. 17.
