From the White House, President Roosevelt addresses the members of the American Youth Congress and the young people of the United States—WOL, WRC, WMAL and WJSV, 12:30 p. m.

Puccini's "La Boheme" is broadcast from the Metropolitan Opera House. Singing the role of Mimi is Bidu Sayao, Brazilian soprano. Others in the cast are Giuseppe de Luca, barytone, as Marcello; Ezio Pinza, bass, as Colline; Armand Tokatyan, tenor, as Rodolfo. "La Boheme" was first produced in Turin in 1898 and was adapted from Muerger's novel, "Vie de Boheme"—WMAL, 1:55 p. m.

The Right Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen, associate professor of philosophy at Catholic University, will address the Youth of America on the "Call to Youth" program, sponsored by the National Council of Catholic Women—WRC, 2 p. m.

Bruno Walter, internationally famous conductor-pianist, will conduct the N. B. C. Symphony Orchestra in the first of a series of five weekly concerts. Walter, last of three distinguished guest conductors heard during Arturo Toscanini's absence from the N. B. C. Symphony podium, has chosen Bruckner's "Romantic" Symphony No. 4, in E-Flat Major, and Haydn's Symphony No. 86, in D Major, for his opening concert—WMAL, 10 p. m.
