

Radio to Pay Tribute to Abraham Lincoln on WBBM Today at 3:30

The "Pursuit of Happiness" program pays tribute to the Great Emancipator this afternoon in two noteworthy presentations on station WBBM at 3:30.

Henry Hull, of stage fame, and Kingsley Colton, boy air star, will present excerpts from Paul Hogan's as yet unproduced, "Mr. President."

The second portion of the tribute will be George Kleinsinger's "The Stuff Abe Lincoln Was Made Of." Clyde Barrie, Negro baritone, will put rhythm into the poet's words.
