

John Garfield To Star In "Land's End" For Kate Smith

Abbott And Costello Will Do Old Favorites;
Sweet Songs Scheduled To Be Sung By
Lucille Manners

John Garfield, a Group Theatre graduate and now one of Hollywood's brightest stars, will appear in Denis Plimmer's drama, "Land's End," on the "Kate Smith Hour" over WABC Friday, at 8:00 p. m.

Abbott and Costello, now on the road with "Streets of Paris," will return to New York for the broadcast which stars Kate Smith in a selection of old favorites and new song successes. In the musical portion of the program, Miss Smith will be supported by the Ted Straeter swing singers and the Jack Miller orchestra. Parker Fennelly and Arthur Allen will present another of their "Snow Village Sketches."

"Accent on Crime," an original drama by Max Marcin, will be a highspot of the "Johnny Presents" program Friday over WABC at 9 p. m. "Accent on Crime" is another thriller in the "Perfect Crime" series. Musical portions of the program, under direction of Johnny Green, will include a repeat solo by Beverly of her much requested "Washboard Blues" and a special arrangement of "Gaucha Serenade" featuring Glenn Cross and Six Diminuttes.

Lucille Manners, soprano star, will sing "O Lovely Night" by Landon Ronald. "With All My Heart" from "The Great Waltz" and "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes" from Kern's "Roberta" during the broadcast Friday, at 8:00 p. m. over WEAFL. Orchestral and choral numbers, conducted by Dr. Frank Black, will be Muir's "Waiting for the Robert E. Lee," Duke Ellington's "Caravan," Hora Staccato" by Diniou-Ileifetz, Brown's "Temptation," the Prelude in G Minor by Rachmaninoff, Edgar's "Bei Murnau," "Hills of Home" by Fox and "Four Indian Love Lyrics" by Woodforde-Finden.

"This Amazing America" quiz show designed to acquaint John Q. Public with the country in which he lives and travels, will be introduced to WJL audience in the first of the weekly broadcast series, Friday, 8:00 to 8:30 p. m.

Frank Munn, tenor, will present the new ballad, "My Son, My Son," from the moving picture of the same name on the "Waltz Time" broadcast, Friday at 9:00 p. m. over WEAFL. Abe Lyman's orchestra will open the program with the lilting "Valse Charmante" and the Manhattan chorus will wind up the half-hour with "You Tell Me Your Dream."

The first program in a series arranged with prominent newspapers thruout the country in connection with the U. S. Antarctic Expedition under Admiral Richard E. Byrd will be presented Friday by the Memphis Commercial Appeal in cooperation with the National Broadcasting Co.

The half-hour broadcast, to be heard at 11:30 p. m. over WEAFL will be shortwaved to the Byrd expedition in Little America thru the transmitter in Schenectady, station WGEO, and is followed at midnight by the "mail bag," heard only over the latter station.
