

# Betty Field Will Star In Kate Smith Show On Friday

Youthful Actress To Appear With John Craven  
And Luther Adler In "Two On An  
Island"

Lovely Betty Field, an unknown two years ago, returns to the Kate Smith Hour as guest star in Elmer Rice's "Two On An Island" over WABC Friday, at 8:00 p. m.

The youthful actress will be co-starred with John Craven and Luther Adler with whom she shares top honors in the Elmer Rice success behind the footlights. Craven, following in the footsteps of his distinguished actor-writer father, Frank Craven, has also won fame on stage and screen.

As her featured selections, Kate will sing "So Long," the new Russ Morgan tune, and "Woodpecker's Song," the hit novelty number. Ted Straeter and the chorus have selected "Got No Strings" and "Gauchos's Serenade." Jack Miller and the band, with the quartet, will give their own arrangement of "Limehouse Blues."

Fritz Kreisler's "The Old Refrain" will be sung by Lucille Manners, soprano star, Friday at 8:00 p. m. over WEAFL. Miss Manners also will sing Lehar's "My Little Nest of Heavenly Blue", "L'Amour Toujours l'Amour" by Friml, and with Ross Graham, baritone, "Sympathy" from Friml's "The Firefly." Graham's solo will be "Every Day is Ladies' Day" by Herbert. The chorus sings the Pilgrims' Chorus from Wagner's "Tannhauser," and the orchestra, conducted by Dr. Frank Black, will include Brahms' Hungarian Dance No. 1, Moszkowski's "Malaguena", "Oxford Street" by Coates, and Dance of the Clowns from Rimsky-Korsakoff's "Snow Maiden."

"See America With Bob Ripley" might well be the title of Ripley's next two Friday night programs. On his program over WABC Friday, the big "Believe It or Not" man will be talking from Marineland in Florida to give an eye witness account of the answer to the question, "Can a man and a shark get along together?" The rest of the program will come from Miami, and will feature the story of how a hymn, popular in Germany, led to the opening and development of Florida. B. A. Rolfe's orchestra with vocals by Linda Lee will round out the program. The following week the entire show will come from the Civic Center in Miami, turned over to Ripley by the city of Miami.

Archibald MacLeish's celebrated verse-drama, "Air Raid," will be presented over WLW, Friday, by an all-student cast of the University of Cincinnati. The broadcast is scheduled from 11:15 to 11:45 p. m.

"Air Raid," excited much comment as a network program last year, is an account in blank verse of the coming of enemy planes to an unnamed European town. It is presented partly as a news broad-

cast, with a "studio announcer" switching to an observer atop a roof in the distant town. The announcer describes the peaceful tenor of life there, broken in upon by rumors of a raid and the efforts of officers to persuade the citizens to take to the cellars. A swift climax brings the enemy planes on the scene to machine-gun the populace.

Two popular romantic tunes, "South of the Border" and "To You Sweetheart, Aloha," will be presented by Frank Munn, tenor, on "Waltz Time" Friday at 9 p. m. over WEAFL. The Manhattan chorus will sing the current waltz, "Long After Midnight," and the orchestra will play Waldteufel's "Tres Jolie" and other selections.
