The Right Hon. Neville Chamberlain, Prime Minister of Great Britain, speaks from London, on "The Progress of the War," another of his series of periodic broadcasts designed to keep the Allied public, and the world at large, aware of England's accomplishments in the war—WMAL, WJSV, WOL, 10 a. m.

Verdi's brilliant "Otello," adapted from Shakespeare's famous tragedy, is the presentation of the Metropolitan Opera. In the brilliant cast are Giovanni Martinelli, in the title role; Elizabeth Rethbert, as the tragic Desdemona, and Lawrence Tibbett, singing the part of the villainous Iago. Ettore Panizza conducts the orchestra, and Milton Cross provides the translation and narration—WMAL, 1:55 p. m.
