## Good Listening: Homemakers

(Prepared by the motion picture committee of the Madison branch, American Association of University Women.)

Not many years ago, almost any time between 9 a. m. and 3 p. m., a swift turn of the dial yielded something like this:

"One-fourth teaspoon salt — then knead—two pounds chopped veal—cream the butter and sugar —add nuts — serve with chili sauce."

Homemakers' programs had a near-monopoly almost half the day. Where are they now? People may have wearied of recipes on recipes, and of the same cooking expert with the same voice droning endless ingredients.

Yet one of the oldest homemakers' programs still retains its popularity.

Its length (WHA, 10-10:45 a. m.) allows a variety which such programs usually lacks, an advantage of which its director, Mrs. Aline Hazard, makes good use. Recipes form only a small part of its offerings. It has a variety of topics, discussed by a variety of experts. It isn't even all talking. A short period each day is given over to music. Irene Bird, the music school student in charge tells the story of music or composer before introducing the performers or playing records.

Even this musical part has a planned variety:

- Monday — "Music of the Nations."
- Tuesday — "Songs That Live."
- Wednesday — "This Month in Music."
- Thursday — "Music of the Church."
- Friday — "Ballroom Melodies."
- Saturday — "Music of the Home."

Half of the talking part of this program deals with subjects of wide interest, as the following schedule will show:

Monday — Questions and Answers. These forums are conducted by a group of home economics students. The questions, which may be sent in by any one, are answered by members of the resident or extension home economics staff.

Tuesday—Garden Club of the Air. Successful gardeners give the talks or interviews. Last Tuesday, H. J. Rahmlow, secretary to the State Horticultural society, talked on "Winter Gardening."

Wednesday — Consumer Problems, in which members of the home economics staff give valuable information on buying and spending. Twice a month books for homemakers are reviewed.

Thursday — Health, a request program which suggests exercises for health.

Friday—Book Reviews. This program has had a large following for years. Charlotte Wood, Jennie Schrage, and Mary K. Reely are among the reviewers heard most often on it. Usually new books are reviewed; but, recently, Miss Reely gave four reviews of old books, comparing them with recent fiction.

Saturday — Family Relationships, a varied program designed to reach different members of the family.

Schedules of this homemakers' hour for March and April may be had for the asking by writing WHA, Madison. The success of this program indicates that variety of topic and speaker are helpful in informational programs.
