

Famous Radio Team Will Be On 'We, The People' Program

Marilyn Hare And Billy Jones To Do Farewell Broadcast Together; Warden Lawes To Also Be Guest

One of the most famous teams in radio, that of Jones and Hare, which is now composed of Marilyn Hare and Billy Jones, will make its farewell kilocycle appearance on Gabriel Heatter's "We, The People" Tuesday at 9:00 p. m. over WABC.

Originally composed of Billy Jones and Ernie Hare, early radio's "The Happiness Boys," Hare died and his daughter stepped in to carry on.

At that time the new team appeared on "We, The People." Motion picture executives were so impressed that they signed Marilyn Hare to a contract.

Other guests will include Warden Lewis E. Lawes, noted penologist, and William Hartfield, of Anniston, Ala., who will tell how he returned to jail 17 years after his escape.

R. G. Pressing, of Lilydale, N. Y., will relate a psychic experience as a challenge to Joseph Dunnigan, who debunked psychic phenomena on the program recently, and two celebrities of the theatre of 20 years ago, William Faversham and Minnie Dupree, will also appear.

The King's Men will sing "Lazy Rolls the Rio Grande" on WEAF on the Fibber McGee and Molly program Tuesday, at 9:30 p. m. Billy Mills' orchestra will play "Louisiana Hayride," and "Do I Love You?"

Henry Hull, distinguished actor of the stage and screen, will play the title role in "Enoch Crossby—The Spy," based on a little-known story of the American Revolution, during the broadcast of "Cavalcade of America," Tuesday, from 9 to 9:30 p. m., over WJZ.

Crosby, an itinerant cobbler, was a spy for the Revolutionary forces who accomplished his work by posing as a British informer. His name and career were clouded not only at the time he lived but also at a later date when James Fenimore Cooper based the first real American novel on him.

Hull, who was the first and most famous of the Jeter Lesters in "Tobacco Road" has been on the Broadway stage since 1911.

Noah's troubles in the Ark were no worse than those faced by the Aldrich Family during the broadcast with Ezra Stone over WJZ Tuesday, at 8 p. m. Henry's efforts at financial independence by raising rabbits and inaugurating a carrier pigeon messenger service lead his father into embarrassment and leave Mrs. Aldrich with servant problems. Henry learns also there is no threat of race suicide among rabbits and simultaneously receives a lesson in multiplication.

"The Body Beautiful, or Matter of Reform" is the title of the drama which finds a husband, fat and forty, in the canine hovel when he dares to challenge his wife's plan to reduce his figure during the "Dog House" broadcast, Tuesday at 10:30 p. m. over WEAF. In a lighter vein Virginia Verrill will sing "careless" and Bob Strong's orchestra will present "Chatterbox."

The National Modern Pioneer's banquet, featuring addresses by two of the country's leading manufacturers, and a drama based on the work of living inventors, will be brought to the radio audience, Tuesday from 9:30 to 10:30 p. m., over WJZ.

Charles F. Kettering, vice president of General Motors in charge of research, will speak on "Pioneering Never Ceases." Kettering will be heard from his laboratories in Florida.

Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, head of the American Museum of Natural History and famed zoologist and explorer, will debut as
