

Arturo Godoy To Be Guest On Pearce Show Wednesday

South American Fighter Will Engage In Verbal Battle With "Elmer Blurt" Over WABC At 8 P. M.

Arturo Godoy, South American heavyweight who left the fistic world gasping with amazement when he went the full 15 rounds with Champion Joe Louis, will make a guest appearance on the Al Pearce and His Gang program on Wednesday, over WABC from 8:00 to 3:30 p. m.

Godoy will tangle verbally with that noted radio personality "Elmer Blurt," as portrayed by Al Pearce. Other members of the Pearce gang who will take verbal swings out of the wonder boy of South America will be Artie Auerbach, dialectician, and Arlene Harris, known far and wide as the "human chatterbox."

Musically the program will feature Carl Hoff and the orchestra presenting the melodious Victor Herbert selection "Indian Summer," and Marie Green and the "Merry Men" contributing a classical composition in the swing-time motif.
