

Jose Iturbi To Be Heard On "Sunday Evening Hour"

Brilliant Pianist Arranges Outstanding Program;
Three Film Stars Cast In Drama,
"Winter In Paris"

The brilliant international pianist, Jose Iturbi, will make a radio appearance on the Sunday Evening Hour. He will be heard with the Symphony orchestra and chorus under the direction of Eugene Ormandy over WJR from 9 to 10 p. m.

Iturbi offers the brilliant and familiar Finale to Mendelssohn's Concerto in G Minor, the popular "Liebestraum" by Franz Liszt, and a composition reminiscent of his native Spain, "Sevilla" by Albeniz.

The program includes a symphonic arrangement of the old American folk tune, "The Legend of the Arkansas Traveler." by Harl MacDonald, Rachmaninoff's Prelude in G Minor, as orchestrated by Eugene Zador, and the waltz, "Roses from the South," by Johann Strauss.

Don Ameche, Maureen O'Sullivan, and Warren William will star in a drama of intrigue and espionage against a background of modern war-torn Europe when they appear in "Winter In Paris," on the "Screen Guild Theatre" over WABC Sunday, March 3, at 7:30 p. m.
