

Two Broadway Stars To Be Heard On Kate Smith Hour

Richard Haydn And Luther Adler Set On Program At 8 P. M. Friday; Bob Ripley To Present Novel Idea

Richard Haydn, star of Broadway's new musical comedy, Rice's new drama, "Two On An Island," will be the double-header attraction of the "Kate Smith Hour" over WABC Friday, at 8:00 p. m.

Haydn, young British comedian, will present a specially written humorous dialogue of the type that is bringing him acclaim in "Two For The Show." Adler, supported by his screen and stage star wife, Sylvia Sidney, will star in an original dramatic sketch.

Somewhere in the United States is a lucky couple who will be heard on the radio for the first time as King and Queen of Honeymoon Isle, tropical paradise in the Gulf of Mexico off the coast of Tampa, Fla., on Bob Ripley's "Believe It or Not" program Friday, over WABC at 10:30 p. m.

The King and Queen, whose subjects are to be 50 newlywed couples, will be selected by Clinton M. Washburn, New York broker and owner of the island which opens to honeymooners Saturday, for free two-week vacations. Mr. Washburn, who will be interviewed in New York by Ripley, will select the royal lovers in time to assure their appearance on the program. With the entire airing dedicated to romance, the dramatization will tell how Tahiti got its name when the island's 18-year-old queen, talking of love with the shipwrecked captain of a French frigate, discovered that there was no Polynesian word for honeymoon.

Latest of the Broadway hit tunes is "Friendship," from "Du Barry Was a Lady," which the Swing Fourteen will offer in a special Ray Bloch arrangement on "Johnny Presents" Friday, over WABC at 9 p. m. The "Perfect Crime" drama by Max Marcini will be "The Thrill Seeker," directed by Jack Johnstone and peopled with well known radio names headed by Walter Greaza. Additional music includes "How High the Moon," by contralto Audrey Marsh and "That's Why Darkies Were Born" by Bill Hargraves, tenor. Johnny Green and the orchestra will revive "Lady Be Good" and feature "I've Got My Eyes on You."

Dvorak's "Songs My Mother Taught Me" will be Lucille Manners' first solo over WEA. Miss Manners also will sing "La Danza" by Rossini, "I'll Follow My Secret Heart" from Noel Coward's "Conversation Piece," and with Ross Graham, baritone, "Here in My Arms" by Rodgers. Graham's solo will be the traditional "Has Sorrow Thy Young Days Shaded." The Cities Service offers "Hills of Home" by Fox, and ensemble selections are "Give a Little Whistle" by Harline, and Porter's "Begin the Beguine." Dr. Frank Black will conduct the orchestra in Kreisler's "Liebesfreud," "Saturday Night" by Sanders. Tavan's "Sierra Morena" and "Chicken Reel" by Daly.
