Good Listening: to Learn

Each year the number of hours carrying good programs over the air increases in response to the desires of the audience. The current season has brought a great variety of programs about interesting facts. The high points of a great man's life live again in dramatic dialog. By the same means, the thrill and fatigue of exploration or of scientific discovery come alive. These are not so-called "dry" facts, but significant facts, so-presented that they stir the imagination.

National networks and educational institutions cooperate in presenting some of them. The University of Chicago is back of "The Human Adventure," heard at 4 p. m. Saturday, WBBM. Its range of audience is wide—90 stations; its range of subjects even wider: Origin of the Earth, Infantile Paralysis, Ancient Writing in Clay, Acoustics, the Bible.

The program of the Smithsonian institution "The World Is Yours, Sunday, 3:30, WMAQ, is almost as varied. This month it will present: March 10, Conquest of Noise; March 17, Our Changing Wildlife; March 24, American Pharmacy; March 31, Opening of the Far West.
