Capper is a leading minority member of the senate committee on agriculture and forestry and a spokesman for the farm states in Republican councils. He has been one of the chief consultants in formulating the party's agriculture policies.

Capper will answer statements made by the president, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, and Postmaster General Farley when they addressed farmers on the anniversary of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.
