

Famed Easter Cantata Will Be Featured On Barn Dance

Oboler To Wind Up Current Series Starring Nazimova; Old Ranger To Present "Sermons In Stone"

Dubois' famed cantata, "The Seven Last Words of Christ" with Charles Sears, tenor, Reinhold Schmidt, bass, and Avis Leone, soprano, as soloists, a 14-voice chorus and an orchestra conducted by Glenn Welty, will be heard during the National Barn Dance, Saturday at 9 to 11 p. m. over WJZ.

The work was first performed two years ago in the Hayloft and is being repeated in answer to many requests. Uncle Ezra (Pat Barrett) will act as narrator for the broadcast. The program also will include "When You Were a Tulip," by the Hoosier Hot Shots. "The Bells of St. Mary's" by tenor Henry Burr. "The Easter Parade" by Ann, Pat and Judy, and "Chapel Bells" by the male octet. Eddie Peabody, Arkie, and Joe Kelly, m.c., complete the program roster.

Arch Oboler, radio's most prolific dramatist, will wind up his current NBC series in New York, starring Nazimova in his 53rd and final program over WEAJ, Saturday, at 8:00 p. m. Then he plans a four-week vacation in Honolulu with his wife before returning to Hollywood.

Nazimova, and all others of the original cast, are to be presented in a revival of "The Ivory Tower", Arch's most powerful stream-of-consciousness drama, in the March 23 broadcast.

"Sermons in Stone" is the Old Rangers true story for the "Death Valley Days" broadcast, Saturday, at 9:30 p. m., over WEAJ. The tale is of Steve, a simple Portuguese stone mason, whose monument stands today in Death Valley, erected by fellow workers.
