

Miriam Hopkins To Star In Screen Guild Show Sunday

Ray Milland And Adolphe Menjou Will Have Leading Male Roles; Benny Will Be Guest Of Orson Welles

Miriam Hopkins will make one of her rare radio appearances when she joins Adolphe Menjou and Ray Milland in "The Morning Glory," on the Screen Guild Theatre under direction of Roger Pryor, Sunday, over WABC at 7:30 p. m.

Written as a Broadway play by Zoe Akins, "The Morning Glory" deals with the experiences of an amateur actress who comes from a small town and tries to work her way to stage stardom by sheer effort and ability.

Miss Hopkins will portray the actress. Adolphe Menjou, donating his second appearance this year on the Screen Guild Theatre enacts the producer role which he did in the movie, while Ray Milland will be heard as the author in love with Miss Hopkins.

Jack Benny, who learned enough about grunting and groaning from Orson Welles last week to qualify as a wrestler, will put into practice his new and gained knowledge of dramatic technique during his broadcast with May Livingstone, Phil Harris, Dennis Day and Don Wilson over WEAf Sunday at 7 p. m.

To fill out the day, Jack will return Welles' favor by appearing on the latter's WABC broadcast at 8 p. m. as well. He will star in Orson's radio version of the stage success, "June Moon," altho he still doesn't feel equal to attempting the role of "Mr. Chips" on his own.

The Easter program of the Sunday Evening Hour will present for the first time on radio an audience of 5,000 people singing the Handel work "Hallelujah Chorus," as the feature presentation of the broadcast over WJk from 9 to 10 p. m.

Richard Crooks, distinguished Metropolitan Opera tenor, returns to the program as guest artist of the evening. Victor Kolar returns to conduct the Ford Symphony Orchestra and mixed chorus.

In the presentation of the "Hallelujah Chorus" the massed church choirs of Detroit have been invited to participate as members of the visible audience of 5,000 who will witness the broadcast in a Detroit auditorium.

Vera Vague, zany characterization by Barbara Jo Allen, who in her saner moments is one of radio's foremost dramatic stars, is wending her erratic way across the continent and will join Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy in New York for the broadcasts starting Sunday at 8 p. m. over WEAf.
