

Story Of John Fitch Will Be Told On Cavalcade Show

Thomas Mitchell, Hollywood Character Actor, Will Portray Role Of America's Steam Navigation Pioneer

Thomas Mitchell, Hollywood character actor, will star in "The Story of John Fitch," tale of America's pioneering efforts in steam navigation to be the "Cavalcade of America" drama, Tuesday at 9 p. m. over WJZ.

John Fitch was a visionary whose inventions were condemned to failure for the crime of being ahead of their time. Fitch invented the steam packet, and saw it become an instrument for the country's betterment, but met defeat on all sides when he tried to have his work accepted and financed.

Mrs. Archibald Dauphine, a member of the only family now living on a fabulous island of buried pirates' treasure, will share honors with Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt, the noted sportsman, on Gabriel Heatter's "We, the People," Tuesday at 9 p. m. over WABC.

Also to be interviewed by Heatter are Richard Wetherill, of St. Louis, Mo., who leads his own orchestra despite an accident which has confined him half paralyzed to a wheel chair, and Newell Fariss, of Lexington, Ky., who accidentally shot his nephew while playing with a loaded gun.
