Kay's "College" Rounds Out Two Years On Air; Pearce Gang To Take Own Census

Bronzed and invigorated by his six-weeks in Miami, Kay Kyser will round out two years as quizzzy dean of the "College of Musical Knowledge" during the broadcast Wednesday at 10 p. m. over WEAF. In a brief ceremony observing the occasion Kyser will assist the "class" in discarding their "sophomore" garb.

"Last Night's Gardenias," a favorite song of several seasons ago, will be crooner Dick Todd's solo during the Wednesday broadcast at 8:30 p. m. over WEAF. Todd and chorus will sing "Singing Hills" and Bob Strong's orchestra will play, "Oh, What You Said," "Say Si Si" and Cherokee. Slaphappy Grandpappy Cliff Arquette will boss the comedy department with the assistance of Bud Vandover and M. C. Don McNeill.

Fred Allen, resuming his familiar role of Inspector Bungle, will attempt to solve the mystery of a plugged song-plugger in a "dramatic" sketch on his program Wednesday at 9 p. m. over WEAF.

Appearing as twin feature of the program will be a funnyman by the name of T. Hee. Mr. T. Hee is a Walt Disney associate and director-animator of "Pinocchio." Fred's other famous features, comedy by Portland Hoffa and Harry Von Zell, and melody by Wynn Murray, the Merry Macs, and Peter Van Steeden and his Troubadours.

Al Pearce and His Gang will jump the gun on Uncle Sam and take their own census during their program on WABC Wednesday at 8 p. m. Pearce, Artie "C. B. Kitzel" Auerbach, Carl Hoff and Arlene Harris all will be concerned with their questions and answers which will predate the official queries scheduled to begin April 1.
