Cinderella Girl Of 1939 To Preview New Film, "Star Dust;" Massey To Do Lincoln Role On Air

Linda Darnell, Hollywood's Cinderella Girl of 1939, will desert screenland for New York to preview her new picture, "Star Dust" on the "Kate Smith Hour" Friday at 8 p. m.

Sharing spotlight honors with Miss Darnell as star of the musical portion of the program, Kate will introduce her regular program features including Abbott and Costello, the Ted Straeter Singers and Jack Miller and his orchestra. A novelty guest feature is still to be announced.

Raymond Massey currently appearing as Lincoln in both the stage and screen versions of "Abe Lincoln in Illinois," is now scheduled to give his impersonation of the great president on the radio as well.

The star will make a guest appearance on Greyhound's "This Amazing America" to give his justly celebrated interpretation of the Gettysburg Address. The program will be heard locally on WLW at 10 p. m. Friday.

When world's heavyweight champion Joe Louis engages Johnny Paycheck, rangy Des Moines battler, Friday in the tenth defense of his title, the melee will be broadcast over WJZ.

Sam Taub and Bill Stern, who have covered many of Louis' title defenses since he won the historic diadem in 1937, will describe the battle from ringside at Madison Square Garden, beginning at 10:00 p. m.

Frank Munn, tenor, will present Tchaikowsky's immortal "The Isle of May" and a popular waltz, "How High Is the Moon," on the Waltz Time broadcast, Friday at 9:00 p. m., over WEAJ.
