

Anita Louise And Charles Boyer In Play Wednesday

Popular Actress And Male Star To Be Heard In Dramatization Of Aumonier's Story, "Dark Red Roses"

Anita Louise, screen star, will play opposite Charles Boyer in the dramatization of Stacey Aumonier's short story "Dark Red Roses" in the "Hollywood Playhouse," Wednesday at 8 p. m. over WEAF. In the story, Boyer, in the role of a famous sculptor, learns that women are not molded as easily as clay.

Eddie Peabody, banjoist and old time minstrel man, will revive the ancient art when he appears with Don McNeill Wednesday at 8:30 p. m. over WEAF.

In addition McNeill will be joined by Mercedes McCambridge and Bud Andover in an original skit. Dick Todd, tenor, will offer "My, My" as his solo and Bob Strong's orchestra will go berserk with "Jungle Drums" and "One O'Clock Jump."

Gracie will acknowledge the college vote on the Burns and Allen program, Wednesday at 7:30 p. m., over WABC. Gracie will sing "My, My" and Ray Noble's orchestra will play an original orchestration of "Vote for Gracie." Frank Parker will sing Jerome Kern's popular number "They Didn't Believe Me."

Fred Allen will delve into one of the great mysteries of modern times, the backstage workings of New York's Madison Square Garden, when he interviews Richard Donopria, stage manager of that giant hippodrome, Wednesday at 9 p. m. over WEAF.

Also overnight in the vast amphitheatre which can hold 25,000 spectators, Mr. Donopria has installed a track for the six day bike races, turf for the horse show, seats and ring for a prize fight, and snow and ice for the winter sports festival. Doing quick changes themselves from mirth to melody and back again will be Portland Hoffa, Harry von Zell, the Mighty Allen Art Players, songsstress Wynn Murray, the Merry Macs quartet featuring pretty Helen Carroll, and Peter Van Steeden and his Troubadors.

Stuart Chase, noted economist, will discuss the growing practice of state tax barriers during the Twentieth Century Fund's "Next Step Forward" program over WEAF Wednesday at 11:15 p. m. The broadcast will open with a dramatization, "Balkanizing America," by Albert N. Williams of the NBC production division.
