Waukegan Jester To Do Parody Of Fred's
Broadcast At 6 P. M. Sunday; Kayser

Jack Benny will get revenge on his arch enemy of the airlines by giving his own parody of the Fred Allen program during the Waukegan jester's second and final broadcast from New York, Sunday, over WEAJ at 6:00 p. m.

Since his arrival in New York for the premier of his new movie, "Buck Benny Rides Again," the Sunday night funster has been snooping around the studios watching his rival during rehearsals and broadcasts. Now he claims to have learned the tricks of Allen's trade in provoking laughter from studio audiences, and will expose the drawing comedian on the air. Kay Kyser, the ol' professor, will be answering questions instead of asking them when he and his orchestra are guests of the Bandwagon, Sunday at 6:30 p. m., over WEAJ.

Kay started out to be a lawyer but wound up as a maestro when the University of North Carolina campus found itself without a dance orchestra in the Fall of 1926.

Virginia Simms, Harry Babbitt and Sully Mason will supervise the vocal detours during the Bandwagon ride.
