Boxing

The third and fourth sessions of the National Intercollegiate Boxing tournament, at Sacramento, Calif., will be brought to the air by station WIBA late this afternoon and tonight.

By means of a direct telegraph wire from its studios to the ring-side, WIBA is covering all the bouts for Wisconsin followers of the Badger boxers.

The afternoon reports will start coming in about 4:30 today, and the night bouts shortly after 9 o'clock.

Saturday's championship fights will be on the air starting about 10 o'clock, Madison time. Each Wisconsin bout in the tournament will be described blow-by-blow, with bulletin resumes on all other bouts.
