

Typical Mother of '40, FDR's Mother Appear on Programs Today

Mrs. Charles Mayo, chosen by the Golden Rule foundation as the "typical American mother of 1940," will appear in two Mother's day broadcasts today.

She will be interviewed on WBBM at 11:15 a. m. in a program which will also bring Dr. Joseph Lee of the University of Chicago to the air. In a program at 1:30 on WENR, Mrs. James Roosevelt, mother of the president, will introduce Mrs. Mayo. Others participating in this broadcast will be Dr. Charles W. Mayo, son of the "typical mother"; Clarence E. Pickett of the American Friends Service committee, and John Charles Thomas, baritone.
